Not to add any more pressure to an exciting phase of your life or anything, but you just have to remember one road has a completely different ending than the other. When it

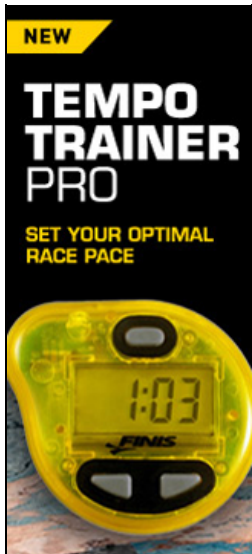
